International Board of Directors Approves Dues Adjustment Resolution

Lions Clubs International supports clubs and members around the world so we can advance our global mission of service together. Our international support and the work of Lions Clubs International is fueled by the international dues of our incredible members.

At the International Board of Directors meeting in October, the Board voted to approve an international dues adjustment resolution that will be voted on at the International Convention in Singapore in 2020.

In recent years, it has become increasingly clear that the services Lions Clubs International has been able to provide to members with the available budget is no longer in line with what Lions need and expect.

The Board of Directors undertook an extensive review of Lions Clubs International's financials, including the implementation of substantial budget reductions. After much consideration, the board proposed to adjust dues by US\$3 effective July 2021, raising dues to US\$46, then adjusted annually for U.S. inflation thereafter. We will use a three-year inflation average not to exceed 3.0% or be lower than 1.5%.

Why an international dues adjustment is needed

We realize the association has been reluctant to adjust dues over the years, and we have not adjusted international dues since 2011. The proposed adjustment will help cover our costs and allow us to suitably serve our members' needs. With that said, the Board of Directors did not take this issue lightly, nor are we minimizing the value of each dollar that our members contribute.



Thank You Does Not Even Cover It!



A heartfelt ROARING thank you to the Sunrise Lions Club for their amazing donation of an Otoacoustic Emissions Machine (OAE) to the Las Cruces Public Schools Health Services Department.

The OAE machine works by placing a small earphone or probe into the ear canal. The probe emits sounds into the ear and measures the sounds that come back. The student does not need to do or say anything during the test. The person administering the test can see the results on the monitor screen. The OAE machine would be available for trained school nurses to use on all students who are hard to test within the school district. This ability will save the parent time and money by not having to refer every hard to test student to their provider or hearing specialist for a standard test the nurse could perform at school.

Following the New Mexico screening standards, school nurses screen the hearing on all pre-k, kinder, 1st, 3rd and 6th graders annually. In addition, LCPS nurses screen the hearing on students new to our district, students whose parents or teacher have expressed concerns about a student's hearing and on all students initially being evaluated for Special Education and all Special Education re-evaluations every three years. In the 2018-19 school year, school nurses screened the hearing on 9,559 students.

Currently, LCPS nurses use an audiometer to test the hearing of students. This screening requires the student to respond (raising a hand or verbalizing) indicating tones were heard through the headphones. However, this often presents a problem for those students who have special needs, are unable to follow instructions due to age, medical conditions or who are cognitively unable to participate.

The New Mexico Lions Operation Kidsight program has been partnering with Las Cruces Public Schools since 2012, using the PlusOptix S09 Vision Screener to do mass vision screenings at our 25 elementary school locations annually. This screening method requires minimal student participation and can detect 6 eye conditions that require follow up by an eye care professional. For convenience and to minimize the loss of instructional time, nurses do the mass hearing screenings while students are already out of class for their eye screenings. Inevitably, there are always students at each site who cannot have their hearing tested with the audiometer due to their special needs. This is where the OAE machine will be a beneficial resource, available to the school nurses to use on these hard to test students.

LCIF Approved Grants

The majority of them were emergency grants for districts to help with Corona Virus. Some were donating the money to food banks, others for PPE equipment. The uses are many and varied. The table shows other districts who have applied for grants that haven't been awarded yet. This report doesn't even show the disaster grants that were awarded lately for the tornadoes in the south.

At our last LCIF phone call, they were encouraging districts in hot spot areas to apply for emergency grants. Many Lions on the phone were worried about the Navajo reservation. Maybe we could help them?

Please continue supporting LCIF. Just because many of the LCI offices are closed, it doesn't mean that LCIF isn't still in need of your donations.

Grant projects being funded:

- Most of the projects that are being funded are for PPE. Those include: mask, gowns thermometer, and testing kits.
- Most of these districts are working in conjunction with hospitals, long term care facilities, medical centers, and emergency management systems (ex. Fire departments, EMT, etc.)

The priority for the emergency grants are for medical needs, not to provide food.

Other information:

- If a district qualifies for the DCG they could use that for food or other COVID related projects if they are denied for the emergency grant

Remind Lions not to send in duplicate request because they will delay the response time. Response time will not exceed a week.

As of May 4, 2020, LCIF has awarded **182 grants** totaling **US\$3,368,655** for COVID-19 relief activities.

Emergency LCIF Grants

This is from PIP Joe Preston. Just an example what Lions are doing in one district!

Here is but one example of what our \$10,1000 Emergency LCIF Grants are being used for, as reported by PDG/DC Mary Krough:

We contacted Operation Faceshield in Ann Arbor , Michigan. This organization makes face shields and distributes them gratis. All we had to do is pay for postage. We initially ordered 100 to check the quality of the faceshields. We received many compliments so have just ordered 200 more. (They supply the entire U.S. so I want to be considerate.)

From a small local supplier we are ordering: hospital grade disinfectant, 3 ply masks, (we elected not to order the N-95 because of the cost and others are purchasing them), 4 different sizes of gloves and booties. We are getting a good price from this supplier and it's helping him stay in business because his regular accounts are businesses that are not operating). At another supplier we are getting tyvec suits when they're available.

All 85+ nursing homes in all four of counties have been contacted and most have wanted supplies. One nursing home in particular in Middlesex County receives all the positive nursing home patients upon hospital discharge. We contact them daily for their needs since these supplies are sometimes difficult to obtain.

Most police departments, fire departments and shelters have been contacted and have also received supplies. Every evening we access where we're at with supplies, what requests we've received and 4 teams go out the next morning. Most mornings it starts with a trip to our supplier, a meeting of the teams to "stock up" and off they go delivering. Fortunately when our supplier receives a shipment, we're one of the first he calls to tell us what has come in. Masks for instance comes in, in dribbles. Yesterday I received 10 boxes of 50. Today none came in.

The disinfectant we're giving out comes in gallon containers which you mix 2 ounces to a gallon of water. Some of our clubs have gone the extra mile and have provided 55 gallon containers with spigots to their ambulance companies. The entire gallon can be poured in the barrel and filled with water. This really simplifies using it.

Publicity- Our local Fox television station today asked for a video of our work. We are continually putting pictures on facebook. (google Don Grise and you'll see 12 he put up yesterday) All our supplies have LCIF logos on them along with a 2nd sticker asking them to send us an acknowledgement.

Our 2nd service project is EXCITING !

Emergency LCIF Grants continued.....

Gowns are a premium ! There is just not enough anywhere. When we visit that's the first thing we're asked for. We networked and found a company where the CEO has decided to stop their production and make gowns. I had a great conversation with him. He's purchased the material and has the capability of making the gowns. His company has already made 5,000 gowns. His frustration is that he doesn't have the physical space to have more employees sew the volume of gowns he wants to produce.. I suggested to him that he **PARTNER with the Lions of District 23-C**. He provides the material , pre cut the gowns and the Lions will sew them and distribute them locally to his list. **IT'S A MATCH MADE IN HEAVEN !!** We sent out an email blast and we're starting on Monday. We have 25 Lions ready to begin sewing the **500** gowns we will be receiving. They will be packed in bags of 10 with a label with our logo stating "SEWN BY A CONNECTICUT LION" This is the pilot run . If it's successful we have non Lions that want to participate so we'll add "or a friend of a Conn Lion" and also ask the other 2 districts in Conn. if they want to participate. Our only cost is the thread if someone asks us to pay for their thread and the labels. We should be able to reach a volume of **1000 a week** .

Involve a Veteran Program



Fact Sheet

Lions Clubs International offers an entrance/charter fee waiver to qualifying veteran and active duty military/armed forces service members.

1. This program will be eligible to the first 5,000 certified veteran or active duty service members from all Lions constitutional areas and will run through June 30, 2021.
2. Eligible persons for this program include active duty, retired and honorably discharged service members - including National Guard and Reserve personnel who were called to active duty for other than training - of governmentally recognized service branches from countries within Lions' scope of service (see Lions Clubs International Board Policy).
3. The **Involve a Veteran Certification Form** must be completed by the district governor or club secretary of the appropriate district of club. The form must be submitted to Lions Clubs International's Accounts Receivable and Club Account Services Department when reporting a new member using: MyLCI, Report of Charter Members for new clubs, or EMMR (Electronic Monthly Membership Report) for existing clubs. All information requested must be provided to avoid certification and processing delays. The fee waiver will be processed as a credit on the Lions club billing statement upon receipt of the certification form.
4. Clubs are encouraged to sponsor or defray club, district and multiple district and/or international dues for any eligible service member needing financial assistance.

Frequently Asked Questions – FAQ

- ? Where can I obtain an Involve a Veteran Certification Form?
 - The Veteran Certification Form can be downloaded from the LCI website or requested by emailing membership@lionsclubs.org
- ? Can existing Lions benefit from the Veteran Program?
 - No, the program is an incentive for **new** members to existing or new clubs.
- ? Can a members eligible for the Veteran Program also take advantage of other Lions discount programs?
 - Yes. As an example, a new member can qualify for both a charter/entrance fee waiver under the Veteran Program as well as a student dues discount if they meet the eligibility requirements for both programs.

Involve a Veteran Program

Qualification Criteria

Eligible persons for the **Involve a Veteran Program** membership benefit may receive an entrance or charter fee waiver when joining a Lions club.

The entrance or charter fee waiver is available for up to 5,000 qualifying members.

Eligible persons for this benefit include active duty, retired and honorably discharged military service members - including National Guard and Reserve personnel called to active duty for other than training - from governmentally recognized service branches serving in countries or territories listed in Lions Clubs International's Board Policy.

The benefit runs through June 30, 2021.

Certification Form

An **Involve a Veteran Certification Form** must be submitted to Lions Clubs International's Accounts Receivable and Club Account Services Department when reporting a new member using: MyLCI, Report of Charter Members for new clubs, or EMMR (Electronic Monthly Membership Report) for existing clubs. All information requested must be provided to avoid certification and processing delays.

The fee waiver will be processed as a credit on the Lions club billing statement upon receipt of the certification form.

Certification of Members

The district governor or club secretary is responsible for collecting, reviewing and maintaining copies of verification documents

provided by the military service member. Documents provided should satisfy qualification criteria. Copies of verification documents

SHOULD NOT be sent to LCI, but may be requested.

Definition

Military service is service by an individual or group in an army or other militia, whether as a chosen job or as a result of an involuntary draft, and for purposes of this benefit includes those individuals committed to Lions Clubs International's Purpose and Code of Ethics.


Pick Me

A true story by Lion Bob Callendar

The late Lion Bob Callendar would share the story of how he became a true Lion with anyone, anytime, any place. This is his story!

Bob and his wife were raising two sons in El Paso, Texas in the early '70s. They were doing all the normal stuff you do when you have two boys: sports, Scouts, school activities. About that time, a friend asked Bob, numerous times, to join the Lions Club. Like most of us, Bob protested that he had too much going on. He had two boys, a pottery business, and insurance agency of his own, and he was Chairman of the El Paso Independent School District's Appraisal Board. He was just TOO busy! But after much coaxing, Bob gave in!

Bob joined the "Pride of El Paso" Lions Club in 1972. At one of his first meetings, the Lion Boss instructed all new members to meet him at the armory EARLY the next Saturday morning. The president told them, "You are needed to get all the kids on the bus to the Texas Crippled Children's Camp now known as the Texas Lions Camp for Children in Kerrville."



When Bob arrived he was amazed! There were parents and children all over the place. Some of the kids were on crutches, others in wheel chairs and some more were using walkers. The Lion Boss told his members to get in line and take a child and parent to the check-in stations. Imagine trying to do this when most of the kids, and some of the parents, were crying. Well, the child Bob matched up with was in a wheel chair. He looked very frail and he was crying. The boy looked about four years old but in reality he was closer to ten. All through the check-in process the boy's mother fretted and was in tears right along with her son. This child had never been away from home and his mom. Bob kept reassuring both of them that everything would be fine. At this point he actually had no idea if things would be fine because he had no clue what the camp was all about.



At the next Lions meeting, Bob found out that at the Texas Crippled Children's Camp (Texas Lions Camp) they swam, camped, rode horses, canoeed and had cookouts. Bob doubted that the kids he had seen off the week before would do any of those activities.



Bob, along with other Lions members went the next Saturday morning to greet the returning campers. Was he ever surprised when he got on the bus looking for a child to help get off the bus! He heard a voice yelling to him, "Come get me, Lion Bob! Pick me, Lion Bob! Pick me!" Bob moved toward the voice and there was his "little camper" almost falling out of his wheelchair. He was excited, bubbly and nearly jumping up and down. The boy's face was beaming. "Look what I won in a race!" Around his neck was a purple ribbon and attached to it was a small plastic lion. He was ecstatic! He told Bob that he could name the constellations Ursa Minor, Ursa Major because he had seen them while camping.

Fast forward a year. Bob's President asked all new members to meet him once again early Saturday morning to help get the children off to camp. By now, Bob knew that most of the children needed help to do everything. They did indeed ride horse back with a helmet, harnesses and lots of help. They swam in a small pool where wheelchairs and walkers were put right into the water. The campers did arts and crafts and fished. They did almost everything that anyone else would do at camp.

This time, Bob didn't have to look far through the kids to find his little camper. He found Bob! "Lion

Bob! Take me again, pick me." And Bob did. The little boy who had been afraid to go the year before was telling everyone within earshot that they were going to have a great time! He excitedly told them about camping, fishing and swimming! He told them that the hot dogs cooked on the grill were THE BEST EVER. He was a changed boy and Bob loved seeing that!

The campers' return the next week was as hectic and noisy as it had been the year before. The yelling, the laughter and excitement was contagious. The sharing of their adventure was inspiring.

Fast forward yet another year. Bob was busier than ever at home, at work and with Lions. He volunteered to get up early again to see the campers off. He knew more about the Texas Lions Camp for Children, its activities and the accomplishment felt by all the campers. Again he looked for his little camper but found only the boy's mother. With tears in her eyes and a catch in her voice, she told bob that her son had passed away that past winter. She told Bob that before going to camp her son would not join the neighborhood kids to play or even go out to watch. After that first camping experience he had a new attitude, a new positive outlook and was a new child . She thanked Bob and the Lions Club for making such a positive difference in her son 's life .

Even though I know the story's ending , I can't even think of Bob's "little camper" without crying. Bob could never tell the story without crying either. It was during these experiences with the little campers that Bob became a Lion, not just a member of the Lions Club.



Lions Do Have a Resource Both For Recycling Hearing Aids and Referrals for Hearing Aid Assistance

DIRECTOR TAMMY LITTS IS AVAILABLE TO SPEAK AT MEETINGS AND PROVIDE INFORMATION ABOUT THE CENTER LOCATED AT 9500 MONTGOMERY BLVD, NE SUITE 215. SHE CAN BE REACHED AT 505-247-4224. She worked with Lion Ellie and the Transitional Leos in the past.

RECYCLING - The Center checks hearing aids first to see if they can be cleaned and used as loaners to clients waiting for hearing aids. If not, they are sent to a company named Starkey who saves parts for requested repairs.

HEARING AID BANK - The Albuquerque Speech Language and Hearing Center's Hearing Aid Bank (HAB) is designed to assist people with limited resources to obtain entry level digital hearing aids at a reduced cost.
